OBJECTIVE

To provide a two year history of proclamations adopted by the City Council to recognize special days, months or events.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

At the City Council meeting held on June 26, 2018, Council Member Kim Nguyen requested a list of proclamations that have been adopted by the City Council for the purpose of establishing an annual schedule for listing dedications/proclamations on future City Council agendas.

The attached list is a summary of proclamations adopted by the City Council from 2016 through 2018. Often, the City Clerk's Office is contacted by local groups or non-profits to request the City adopt a proclamation on behalf of their organization. Once the group has been vetted as to their work and relationship with the community, the proclamation is typically listed on an agenda for adoption by the City Council. Frequently, a representative receives the proclamation at the City Council meeting. City staff may also request a proclamation be listed for adoption to recognize special events or occasions such as Public Works Week.

Some proclamations are routinely requested, and some are not for various reasons. Traditionally, proclamations have not been calendared for annual listing on City Council agendas mainly because of the changing environment by which the requests have been made. All proclamations adopted during a City Council meeting become a matter of record in the City Council minutes. Mayoral proclamations issued for minor ceremonial events do not become a matter of formal record.

Dear Ms. Hoiby:

On behalf of the City of Garden Grove, I am writing to show our support for the Orange County Sanitation District's (OCSD's) funding request for the United States Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) Title XVI grant as it relates to the OCSD Effluent Reuse Implementation Project - Headworks Segregation. The end goal of the project is to increase the amount of water sent to the Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS), at a cost of about \$45 million. The project will move the Orange County Sanitation District one step closer to its goal of recycling 100 percent of its reclaimable wastewater.

The GWRS is a water recycling project jointly sponsored by OCSD and Orange County Water District (OCWD) that supplements existing water supplies by providing a new, reliable, high-quality source of water to recharge the Orange County Groundwater Basin and to protect it from seawater intrusion. The GWRS takes the treated wastewater from OCSD that otherwise would be sent to the Pacific Ocean and purifies it using a three-step advanced process consisting of microfiltration, reverse osmosis, and ultraviolet disinfection/advanced oxidation.

The OCSD Effluent Reuse Implementation Project - Headworks Segregation will allow for the development of the GWRS final expansion. The project came online in 2008 and was expanded in June 2015 to produce 100 million gallons of high-quality water per day (MGD), enough water for 850,000 residents annually. When completed, the GWRS plant will produce 130 MGD of high-quality water, which will be enough for over one million people.

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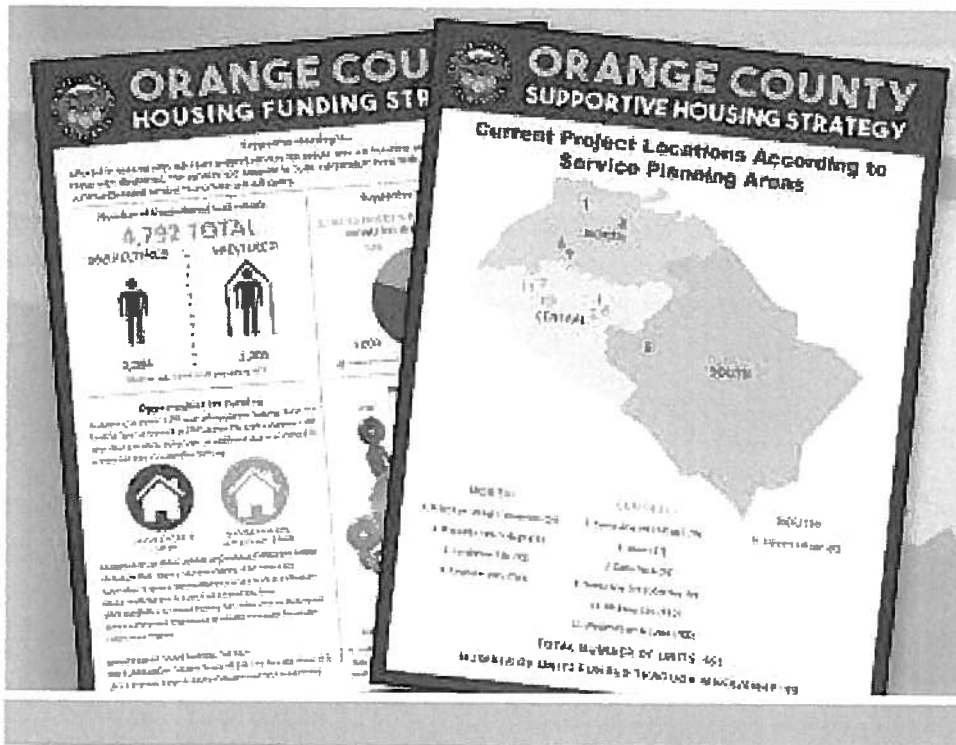

Resources for the Development of the System of Care

On June 12, 2018, the Board of Supervisors took significant actions in addressing homelessness, including:

- Approval of the Housing Funding Strategy
- Approval of Mental Health Services Act \$70.5 Million Spending Plan
- Shelter Crisis Declared to Position County of State Funds

The **Housing Funding Strategy** has the goal of producing 2,700 units of supportive housing with the additional need for 2,700 units of affordable housing options for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The County will work with all 34 cities to align regional policies to prioritize supportive housing for local and regional resources, including helping leverage federal, state and local funding.

The **Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) \$70.5 Million Spending Plan** includes four recommended strategies:

1. Identify 11 current housing projects in the pipeline across the county that have been awarded or applied for funding through OC Community

Resources' (OCCR) Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA), the Special Needs Housing Program (SNHP), or both. The Board's commitment of \$13 million will allow these projects to proceed to the development and construction phases, resulting in 451 units – 310 permanent supportive housing and 141 affordable housing units.

2. Allocate additional funds to California Housing Finance Agency (CALHFA) under the SNHP program.
3. Open a continuous Request for Information (RFI) to coordinate creation of additional permanent supportive housing. OCCR has been charged to advise on financial plans for each project to ensure funding and coordination with County housing strategy.
4. Given the County investments in the creation of housing for homeless populations through this initiative, housing referral preference will be granted to the Orange County Continuum of Care Coordinated Entry System. This assists homeless

persons who meet project-specific eligibility criteria (Veterans, Serious Mental Illness, Seniors, etc.) and are prioritized within the Service Planning Area of a project's location. The Coordinated Entry System will ensure effective response coordination while aligning with the objective of reducing homelessness regionally.

The **Shelter Crisis Declaration** from the County of Orange will make it eligible to receive one-time Emergency Homelessness Aid Block Grant from the State to address homelessness through the construction or operation of emergency shelters, rapid rehousing, homelessness prevention services and other currently unspecified activities. The Homelessness Emergency Aid Program is to be allocated based on 2017 Point In Time Count results and expected to be \$15.5 million for the County and approximately \$5 million for both Anaheim and Santa Ana.

Building Momentum with the Health Care Agency Behavioral Health Services

Homeless Bridge Housing Services - \$4,571,750

On May 22, 2018, the Board of Supervisors approved a Homeless Bridge Housing Services contract with Grandma's House of Hope and Friendship Shelter. This will provide housing resources to adults and families who are experiencing homelessness with at least one adult or member of the household who is diagnosed with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorder. Grandma's House of Hope and Friendship Shelter will assist individuals and families in the program to access housing programs including Continuum of Care permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing programs, assist individuals and families locating rental units and negotiating leases to secure housing.

Recovery Residence Services \$2,400,000

On May 22, 2018, the Board of Supervisors approved Recovery Residence Services contracts to provide a safe and drug-free housing option for individuals experiencing homelessness who are 18 years of age and older with a substance use disorder. Their programs are a stepping-stone toward an individual reclaiming their life and connecting to needed services.

Supportive Housing for Homeless Individuals - \$1,600,200

On May 8, 2018, the Board of Supervisors approved a six-month contract with Illumination Foundation to increase access to supportive housing and assist homeless individuals onto the pathway toward housing. With this contract, Illumination Foundation will establish multidisciplinary teams including nurses, clinicians, substance abuse counselors, peers, site aides, case managers, housing navigators and drivers to provide wraparound services to homeless individuals. At minimum 60 homeless individuals will be served at any given

time. Health Care Agency Outreach & Engagement will work with Illumination Foundation to provide referrals of individuals into the program who are struggling with mental health and/or substance use issues and/or physical disability.

Housing Navigation Services \$1,587,192

On January 23, 2018, the Board of Supervisors approved a contract with Colette's Children's Home from March 2018 to June 2020 to provide Housing Navigation Services.

Under the direction of the Health Care Agency, Colette's Children's Home will provide Housing Navigator Services to identify and negotiate affordable housing opportunities for those living with mental illness. The project is expected to identify at least 45 available housing units annually. It is expected that participants in this program will increase their readiness for permanent supportive housing and be linked with an available unit. Upon placement, they will also be successfully linked with a peer mentor, a case manager, and/or outreach and engagement for ongoing support to sustain their housing.

ACC-OC Permanent Supportive Housing Tour



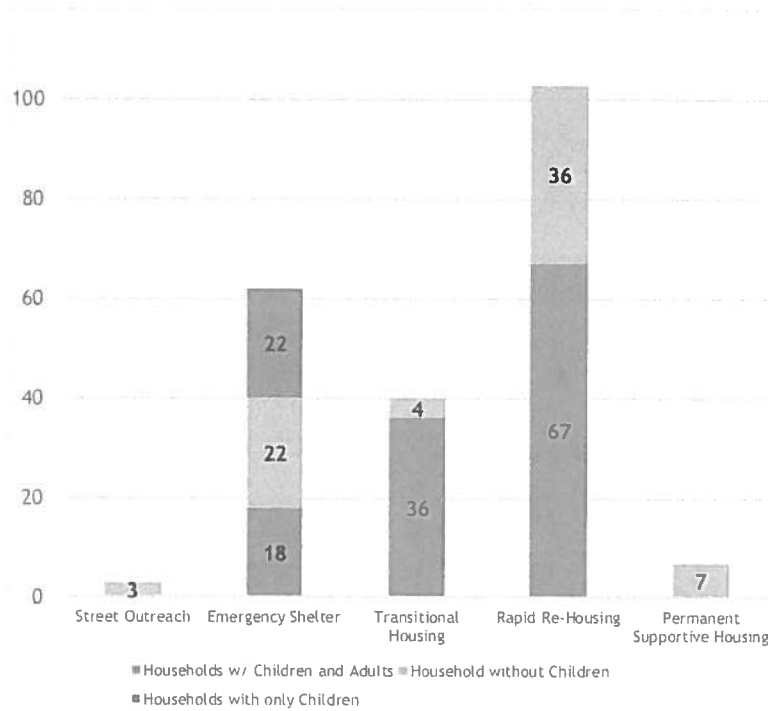
On June 14, 2018, the Association of California Cities – Orange County (ACCOC) hosted approximately 50 individuals, including city leaders and staff, on a tour of permanent supportive housing (PSH) residences across Orange County. The tour served as an opportunity to educate individuals in attendance on the PSH and how they integrate into the surrounding community by providing quality housing and wraparound services.

The tour included stops at:

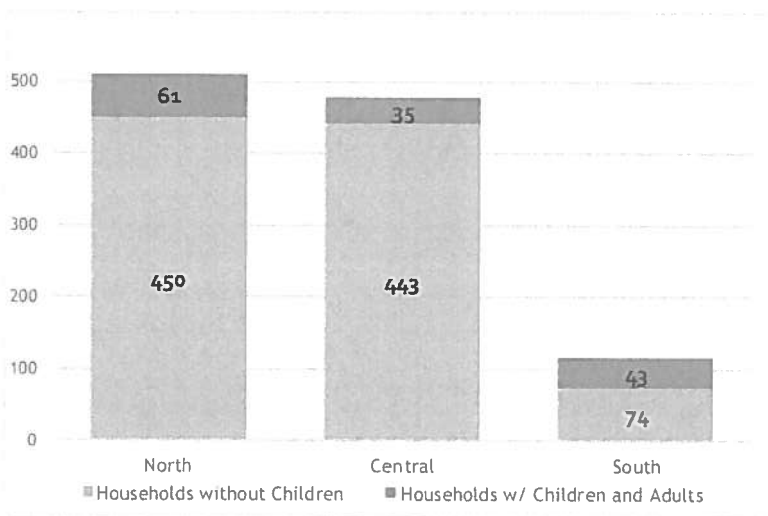
- Family Care Center, an emergency shelter for families in Orange;
- Rockwood Apartments, a 70-unit multi-family housing development in Anaheim serving former homeless families and individuals with severe and persistent mental illness;
- The Orchard, an innovative project involving the rehabilitation of a Santa Ana motel to provide 71 furnished studio and one-bedroom units for chronically homeless individuals and small families;
- Doria Apartment Homes, featuring affordable housing apartments designated for workforce families and 20 apartments for formerly homeless individuals living with mental illness located in Irvine.

CalOptima Grant Opportunity Announcement

CalOptima is proud to provide dollars to the community through the Intergovernmental Transfer (IGT) program. Over the past six years, IGT funds have made a significant impact on the health of Medi-Cal members, and now two additional IGT community grant opportunities are available — IGT 5 and IGT 6/7. The grants must provide services to CalOptima members, but they cannot be used for Medi-Cal contracted services.

IGT 5

IGT 5 makes available \$14.4 million to programs and services in any of the eight priority areas, through a process that includes Request for Information and Request for Proposals. The eight priority areas are listed below:

- 1) Adult mental health services
- 2) Mental health/socialization services for older adults
- 3) Mental health/developmental services for children
- 4) Nutrition education and fitness program for children
- 5) Medi-Cal benefits education and outreach
- 6) Primary care services and social determinants of health programs
- 7) Adult dental services
- 8) Children's dental services

The IGT 5 RFI is due on **July 9, 2018 at 5pm**. The RFP will be released on **September 7, 2018** and the responses are due **October 5, 2018**. The grants will be awarded December 6, 2019. The organization does not have to submit an RFI response to respond to the RFP.

IGT 6/7

IGT 6/7 makes available \$23.6 million to programs and services in any of the three priority areas: opioid and other substance overuse, children's mental health, and homeless health. CalOptima will be proposing the distribution of \$10 million in IGT 6/7 funding to the County of Orange to address the current homeless health crisis. The remaining \$13.6 million will be available for the community through grants in the three priority areas.

The IGT 6/7 RFP will be released on **August 3, 2018** and the responses are due **September 14, 2018**. The grants will be awarded December 6, 2018.

In April 2018, the Social Services Agency (SSA) deployed staff to Bridges at Kraemer Place three times and its Mobile Response Vehicle (MRV) to the Courtyard Transitional Center four times. In May 2018, SSA deployed staff to Bridges at Kraemer Place twice and its MRV to the Courtyard Transitional Center five times.

SSA received 1,327 inquiries for services, including eligibility determinations and re-determinations, as applicable for CalFresh, Medi-Cal, CalWORKs and General Relief.

The chart below provides a brief summary of the SSA program requests received.

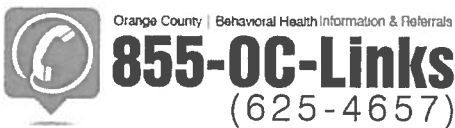

Community Resources Successes to Celebrate

Connecting to Services

A 38-year-old male experiencing homelessness had been living at the Plaza of the Flags for over a year due to family separation. He first came to the Courtyard Transitional Center in April 2018. There he started working with City Net case management who helped him contact OC Links for referral and linkage to a behavioral health outpatient program. City Net helped him coordinate transportation to and from his appointment to help him access the services he needed. He is currently looking for employment and hopes to reunite with his family.



Improving Health and Wellbeing

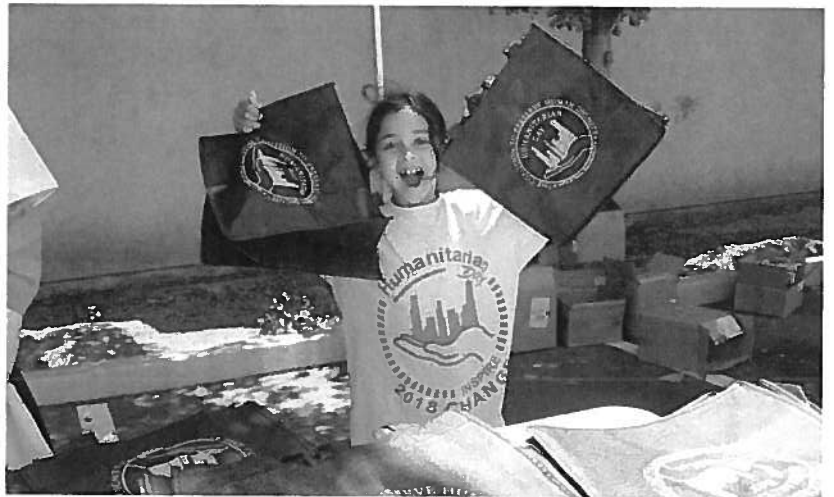
A Public Health Nurse (PHN) assisted an individual at the Courtyard Transitional Center in obtaining needed surgery to improve their health and wellbeing. The PHN developed a trusting relationship with the individual, provided transportation to medical appointments, and accompanied the individual to medical appointments. With the PHN's encouragement and assistance, the individual had the necessary surgery. The PHN will continue to provide support as needed in the future.

Veteran Found His Way Home

An Army veteran experiencing homelessness was first referred to the Courtyard Transitional Center in early January 2018. There he worked with The Midnight Mission case management team to connect with the on-site supportive services. In May 2018, he was prioritized for a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) voucher. With the help of the Veterans Affairs of Long Beach and Volunteers of America (VOA) he located a housing opportunity that would accept his voucher. Community members learned of his transition into housing and provided him with furniture and kitchenware needs, including pots, pans and utensils. Now that he is housed, the Army veteran is working towards addressing his health.

Humanitarian Day

On June 9, 2018, the Intellect, Love, Mercy (ILM) Foundation coordinated Humanitarian Day, as a day of service to celebrate Ramadan. With the help of volunteers they assembled nearly 400 tote bags that each contained a notebook, t-shirt, hygiene kit, socks, pen and water bottles. In coordination with City Net and The Midnight Mission, approximately 350 bags were distributed to individuals staying at the Courtyard Transitional Center. The remaining bags will be distributed on an as needed basis for individuals accessing services at the Courtyard.





Successes to Celebrate

Bringing Home Baby

In September 2017, a couple first came to Bridges at Kraemer Place seeking a safe place to rest and work toward ending their homelessness. The woman was six months pregnant and her partner was recovering from surgery due to cancer. While in the shelter, the couple focused on developing and working their housing plan, maintaining their sobriety, and participating in weekly Narcotics Anonymous meetings. This couple took advantage of the on-site supportive services from OC Health Care Agency Comprehensive Health Assessment Team – Homeless (CHAT-H), Jobs for Life, and Career Wise. During their last week in the program, the woman gave birth to a healthy baby boy and was discharged from the hospital into the couple's new apartment with the help of Mercy House's rapid rehousing program. With the help of Hope 4 Restoration, a community organization, the new family received home furnishings and kitchen items to help them make their apartment into a home.

Phase II Construction Complete

On Saturday, May 5, 2018, while construction was still underway, Bridges at Kraemer Place celebrated its first anniversary operating as an emergency shelter for 100 individuals experiencing homelessness. Having the ability to open Bridges at Kraemer Place in phases has allowed the County to shelter approximately 580 unduplicated individuals and help 99 individuals transition into permanent housing.

The completion of Phase II has doubled Bridges at Kraemer Place's capacity from 100 beds for single men and women to 200 beds. Additionally, it will allow for the facility to function as a multi-service center with a medical clinic, computer lab and space for local nonprofits and community organizations to provide services and classes.



Working Together to Achieve Housing Goal

An elderly woman with disabilities entered Bridges at Kraemer Place the first night it opened on May 5, 2017. During her stay she was able to connect with several service providers, which included Adult Protective Services, OC Health Care Agency Comprehensive Health Assessment Team – Homeless (CHAT-H) and Behavioral Health Services, and Orange County Social Services. With their assistance she was able to connect with Social Security Administration to begin the enrollment process for the Representative Payee Program and coordinate and receive medical care, medication management and housing assistance. Through the assistance of Brea Police Department and Coast to Coast she achieved her housing goal.

Reaching His Potential

In January 2018, a man living along the Santa Ana River Trail first connected with a City Net case manager. Through the Flood Control Channel Engagement Initiative, he participated in the 30-day motel-sheltering program and transitioned into Bridges at Kraemer Place in April. The man shared that since he started working with City Net, his life "has been improving ever since he arrived at Bridges at Kraemer Place." At Bridges at Kraemer Place, he worked with Mercy House case managers and participated in employment readiness programs. He received a full time job offer with Assurance Wireless as a Lifeline phone distributor. His performance was outstanding and he surpassed every goal established by his supervisors. Within the first month, he received a promotion. With stable income, he is now working with the Mercy House Rapid Rehousing Program and a housing navigator to find an apartment. He is hopeful he will find an apartment that is close to work and is excited to keep improving his life.

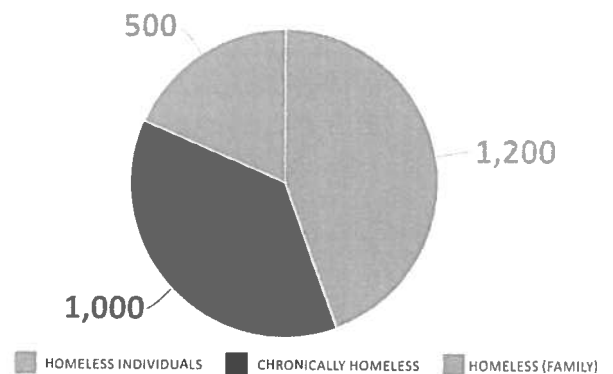

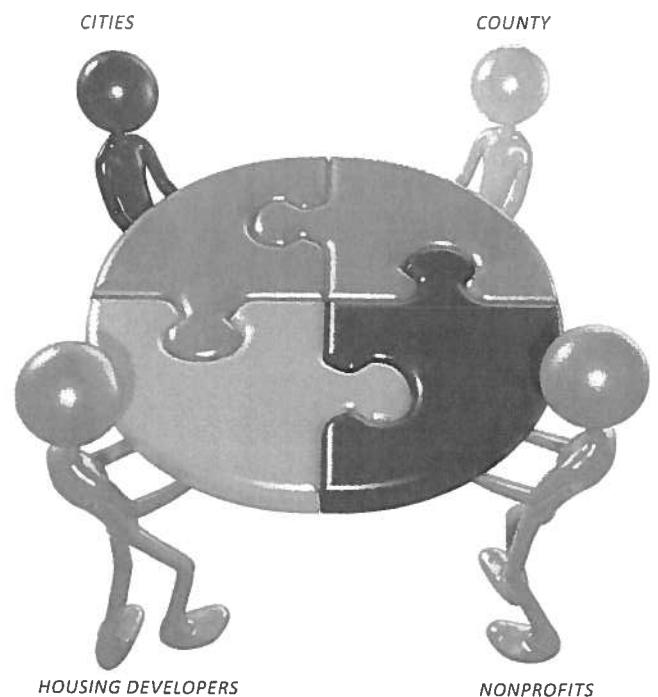

Summer School is in Full Swing!

While school is officially out for the year, nearly 5,000 GGUSD students are taking advantage of enrichment opportunities and credit recovery classes offered during the summer. Summer School began June 25 for elementary school students and is offered at four schools with a focus on support for English learners, math, science, and computer coding. 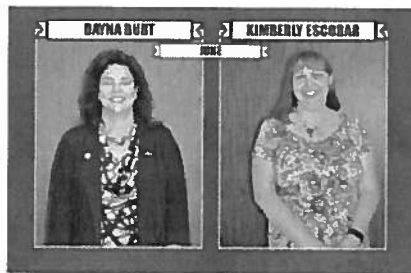
Right now, her favorite subjects in school are math and science but in the future, Mayares hopes to pursue her dream

Musicians, music educators and students to converge in Garden Grove

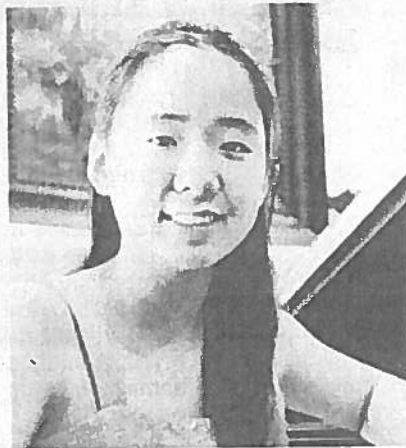
Annie Li of Irvine is already a champion piano player.

But she could add another trophy to her case when she represents Southern California and competes against her Northern California counterpart Saturday during the Music Teachers Assn. of California (MTAC) Piano Concerto Competition.

"I'm excited. I'm not too nervous," said Annie, 15, who recently finished her freshman year at Portola High School in Irvine. "I'm still trying hard to practice. Most of the time, I get really nervous before I perform. But when I actually start playing, it gets a lot better, because I just think about the music and try my best and have fun."

Annie will perform Franz Liszt's "Rhapsodie Espagnole S. 254," which she played in May at Carnegie Hall in New York City. Annie is one of about 4,000 expected to converge on the Hyatt Regency Orange County in Garden Grove, where the MTAC's 108th convention is taking place Friday through July 3. It's an annual, statewide gathering of music teachers, students and professional artists to celebrate and advance music education.

including a Young Artist Guild Recital at 8:30 p.m. Friday, the Piano Concerto Competition at 7:45 p.m. Saturday, the world premiere of Bruce Stark's "Three Dances" at 1 p.m. July 1, a Vocal, Orchestral Instruments, Chamber Music, Ensemble (VOCE) Recital at 7:45 p.m. July 1, and the Jon Manasse/Jon Nakamatsu Duo at 8:30 p.m. July 2.

The celebrated Ahn Trio will participate in a "musical conversation" Friday and perform Saturday with a piano trio and July 1 in a master class. (Registration is required to attend.) In



addition, the convention will feature panel discussions, workshops and master classes, an exhibit hall for vendors and other performances.

Founded in 1897, the Music Teachers' Assn. of California offers programs that help teachers and students with instruction, curricula and performance. Similar to a trade organization, the MTAC offers benefits and guidance to its members, a chance to network and certificates of merit for achievement in more than a dozen instruments.

Headquartered in San Francisco, the MTAC is divided into Northern California and Southern California regions, with 63 branches statewide, seven in Orange County.

The annual convention alternates between Northern and Southern California each year. The last time the convention was held in Orange County was in 1984 at Chapman College (now University).

"It's a chance to be with like-minded people that have the same goals," said Rhonda Williams, executive director of MTAC. "I think it's important because we have a lot of teachers just teaching on their own. It's an opportunity to meet other music teachers that have similar goals and bounce ideas off of each other."

Those who participate in the Piano Concerto Competition are not only competing for prestige. They are vying for cash prizes of up to \$650. In her age division, Annie has the opportunity to win \$450. Award money comes from donations to the MTAC Foundation.

Though she doesn't necessarily see music as a career path, Annie said the music, recitals and competitions have added to her quality of life.

"I think the piano is something I want to continue for the rest of my life, because I think it's good for me," said the prodigy, who started playing when she was 6. "A lot of times, the piano is fun to play, and it also helps me express my emotions, so when I'm feeling sad, I can play sad pieces and help myself feel better."

Also on the convention schedule are Alan Chapman, a scholar, composer and deejay on classical station KUSC (91.5 FM), who will deliver a keynote address on Saturday; and Jeremy Siskind, an accomplished jazz pianist, who will perform a recital at 5:15 p.m. Saturday and conduct a master class on improvisation at 1 p.m. July 1.

Here are the top 10 burgers of 2018, plus Burger of the Year

Although it might sound hyperbolic to use the term “life-changing,” a cheeseburger this year indeed shattered my long-held definition of the perfect burger.

This unexpected paradigm shift involved lettuce. Or, rather, the lack of it. The lettuce debate was contentious even before McDonald’s gave us the choice between a Quarter Pounder and the Big Mac. I’ve never liked anything from McDonald’s. But I do love burgers, and I have always admired a leafier recipe: Bun, meat, lettuce, tomato, onion. I could give or take a pickle. The wackier the flavors, the less I’m inclined to order it.

The cheeseburger at The Mayor’s Table knocked me for a loop. It was unexpectedly naked and vulnerable. It was astoundingly delicious.

After the epiphany, I began looking for other undressed burgers. I found plenty, some of which were good but most of what I found just tasted incomplete. The cheeseburger at The Mayor’s Table might be an outlier, but it is the runaway winner for 2018’s Burger of the Year. Here are the 10 best burgers I’ve eaten this year:

1. Mayor’s Table at Lido House — BURGER OF THE YEAR

This cheeseburger is profoundly simple: No lettuce. No tomato. No pickles. Nothing but a huge meat patty, cheddar cheese, aioli and a few slices of lightly grilled onion stuffed into a soft, pillowy sesame seed bun. Every ingredient is meticulously considered. No matter where you stand on the lettuce versus no lettuce debate, you absolutely must try this burger. Bonus: It comes with outstanding hand-cut fries. Cost: \$16. 9. Kaye’s Kitchen

Before you complain that I left your precious In-N-Out off this list, go to Kaye’s Kitchen in downtown Garden Grove. Get the double cheeseburger. The meat patties, the perfectly melted cheddar, the pillowy bun, plus iceberg lettuce, red onion, tomato, dill pickles and mayo. There’s no drive-thru, but trust me: This is better than In-N-Out. Nomination papers are available in the City Clerk's Office at Garden Grove City Hall, at 11222 Acacia Parkway, second floor, by appointment only.

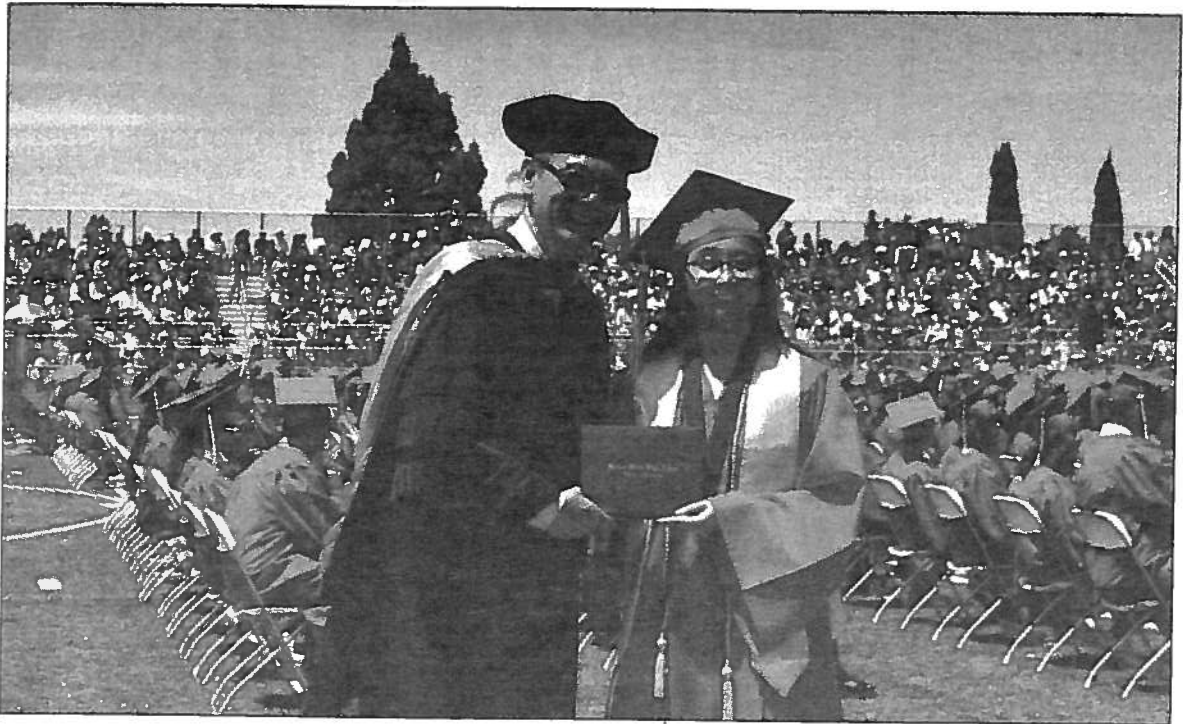

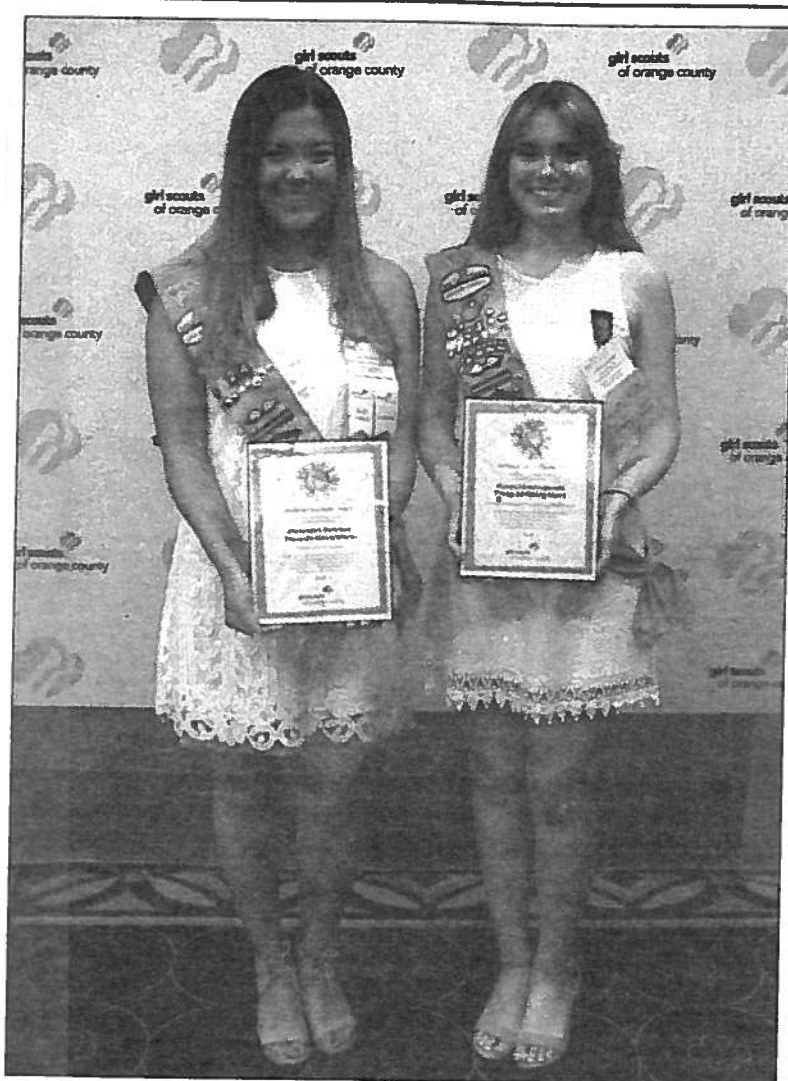

DECLARING INTENT TO PROCESS A GENERAL VACATION OF VARIOUS PUBLIC UTILITY EASEMENTS
OVER THOSE PARCELS 1 AND 2 OF LOT LINE
ADJUSTMENT 007-2014**

The City Council of the City of Garden Grove does hereby resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to Division 9, Part 3, Chapter 3 of the California Streets and Highways Code, commencing with Section 8320, the City Council of the City of Garden Grove hereby declares its intention to process general public utility easement vacations of those certain public use easements over portions of Lots 1 and 2 of Lot Line Adjustment 007-2014, commonly known as 11235 Bowles Avenue, as described and depicted on the attached Exhibit B, which is incorporated herein by this reference.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk is directed to maintain on file in the office of the City Clerk maps or plans showing the particulars of the proposed general public utility easement vacations of those certain public use easements over Lots 1 and 2 of Lot Line Adjustment 007-2014, and reference is hereby made to such maps and plans for particulars as to said proposed vacations.

SECTION 3. The City Council does hereby fix July 10, 2018, at 6:30 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Avenue, Garden Grove, California, as the time and place for hearing all persons interested in or objecting to the proposed vacation, which time is not less than fifteen (15) days from the passage of this Resolution.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk is directed to cause a copy of this Resolution to be published in a weekly newspaper, published and circulated in Garden Grove for at least two successive weeks prior to the time set herein for the Public Hearing.

SECTION 5. The Director of Public Works is directed to post, or cause to be posted, notice of vacation conspicuously along the easements proposed to be vacated at least two weeks before the date of the Public Hearing. The notice shall be posted not more than 300 feet apart, but at least three notices shall be posted. 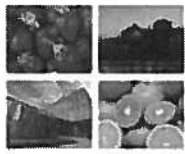

A merger of GGFD into OCFA is touted

The issue of dissolving the city fire department in favor of getting those services from the Orange County Fire Authority surfaced at Tuesday's meeting of the Garden Grove City Council.

Eric Thorson of the Garden Grove Firefighters Assn., Local 2005, told the council that membership of the union was in support of such a change. "The GGFA is in favor of merging with the OCFA." The membership of the union voted "over 90 percent to support the move," he said.

(<https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2017/05/ggfd-logo.png>) He went on to say that he believed that the countywide service could do a better job and at less cost than the GGFD. "We are convinced that the people of Garden Grove will be best served by the OCFA," he said.

The city has not made a decision on such a change. The GGFD dates back to 1926 and was one of the first government services included into the new City of Garden Grove in 1956 when the community incorporated.

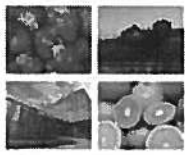
OCFA is headquartered in Irvine, where it has 11 stations. It serves 23 cities, including the nearby cities of Cypress, Santa Ana, Stanton and Westminster. However, the City of Irvine has reported its intention to leave the agency as of

2020, perhaps complicating some financial and operational aspects of the OCFA.

Also on Tuesday night, the council honored Jack Wallin and Marge Wallin as the 2018 Strawberry Ball King and Queen and Senior Volunteer Man and Woman of the Year. Additionally the council recognized the Strawberry Festival Association, its directors and associates, for organizing the 2018 festival.

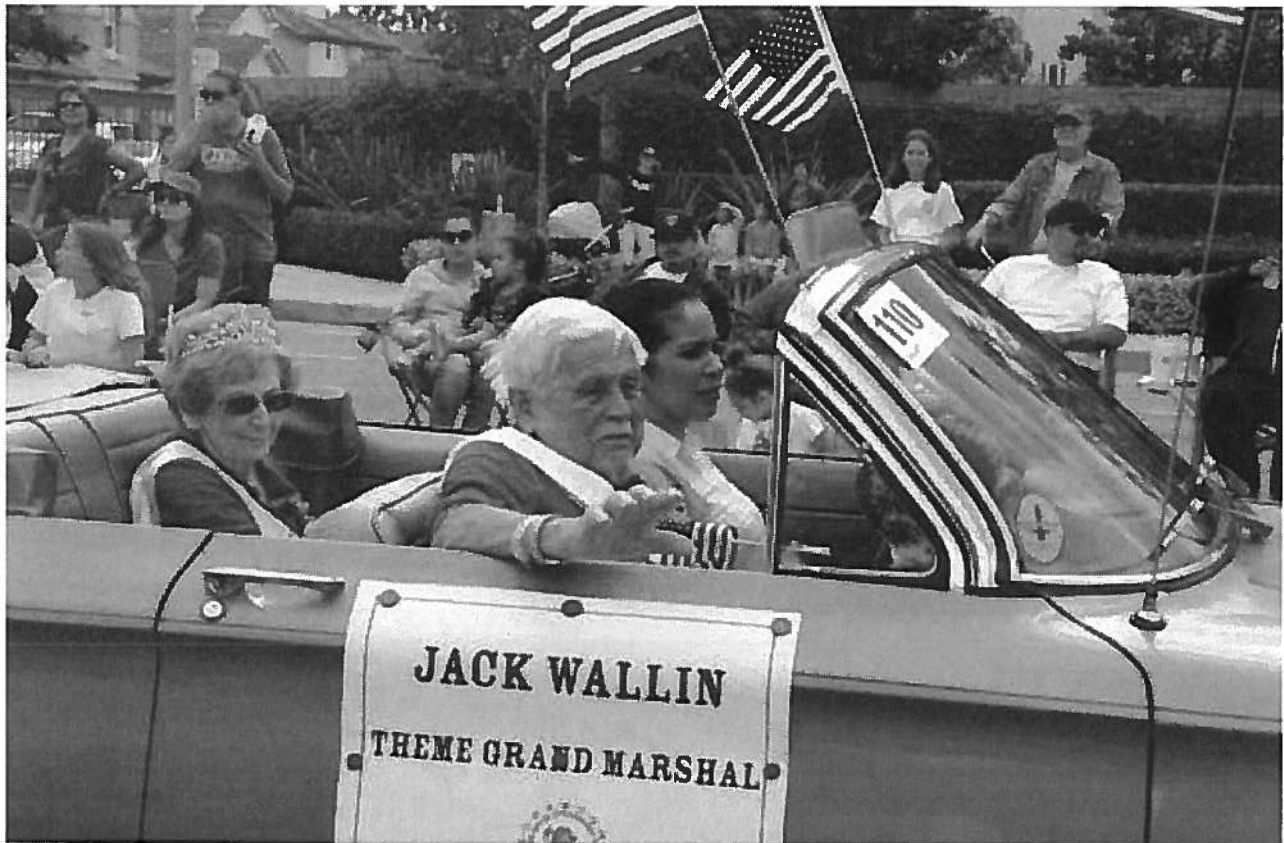

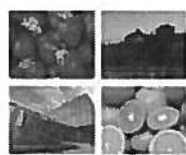
A second “spotlight” will recognize the Strawberry Festival’s directors and associates for organizing this year’s event.

On the inside of the front wall of Aunt Yese's Home Cooking in Garden Grove is the motto "Friendship." That, in a word, sums up much of the appeal of this small but popular eatery.

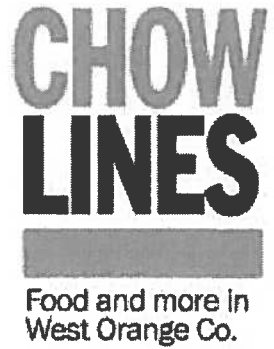

Warmth. Very good food. Reasonable prices. And friendship.

The management and servers are always full of smiles and bon homie. The dishes are "home cooked" in the sense that they taste authentic and flavorful, not like from some pancake assembly line you might expect at a Denny's or IHOP.

On the wall are paintings by local artists. In the seats are loyal customers who have become regulars. At first look, well you might actually have trouble getting a first look. The last time we visited, there wasn't even a sign outside; it was on order, we were told.



BREAKFAST IN PROGRESS

If you can fill a place that's practically invisible, you've got something going for you. Jim is a big fan of the blueberry pancakes. They are the kind with the berries cooked within, not dropped on top as an afterthought. He adds to that always-fresh fruit and walks away happy but not stuffed.

Marilyn is more of an egg girl. Her favorite is two eggs over easy, alongside fruit and an English muffin. "Cooked perfectly and highly recommended."

The menu of available food is extensive, with everything from Salmon Benedict to Homemade Chilaquiles (fresh beans and two eggs) to the usual suspects like French toast and a wide variety of egg dishes, bakery items and sides (Jim votes for the biscuits and gravy).

After 11 a.m. the lunch selections include five kinds of burgers. There are also 11 vegan dishes and a kids' menu.

This is not haute cuisine, but in the important category of really good basic food and service, you will have trouble topping a trip to your new favorite aunt.

STUDY SESSION – CEQA 101: Attorney Ricia Hager, of Woodruff, Spradlin & Smart, presented an overview of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), which provides information to decision makers about the possible environmental consequences of proposed projects before they are approved. Staff and Commissioners discussed and received input on the presentation.

Staff responded that Economic Development was working with the Hyatt Hotel and Embassy Suites on project details, however, most of the land would be a parking lot with only portions being buildable; that the Site C project was currently undergoing value engineering to reduce construction costs; that Garden Brook Senior Village was approved, but not in plan check yet; and that the Brookhurst Triangle was finalizing the first phase with the second phase to begin after the KIA move.

MATTERS FROM STAFF: Staffed noted that the June 21st meeting would begin at 6:00 p.m. with a public hearing item and a study session on Code Enforcement. Also, the July 5th meeting would be cancelled.

League-Sponsored Bond Agency Issues \$15 Million in New Markets Tax Credit Financing for Jordan Downs Plaza

June 22, 2018

Some of the most significant benefits of League membership for cities since 1988 have flowed from the League's co-sponsorship of the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) and California Statewide Communities Development Corporation (CSCDC).

This program provides a variety of public agencies and developers access to low-cost, tax-exempt financing and economic development tools. CSCDC recently provided \$15,000,000 of New Markets Tax Credit (NMTC) allocation to Primestor Development to finance the Jordan Downs Plaza, a new retail shopping center located in the Watts neighborhood of Los Angeles.

About Jordan Downs Plaza

Primestor is a minority-owned developer based in Los Angeles that specializes in retail projects in urban locations throughout the country. Since its establishment in 1992, Primestor has aimed to build community-supported projects in areas overlooked by other developers. Jordan Downs Plaza is part of a master plan to rebuild one of Los Angeles' most distressed public housing estates and is one of the most significant urban revival projects currently being undertaken in the country. Among other challenges, current residents do not have convenient options for purchasing groceries, for example, and must take multiple buses to access basic dry goods and services. To meet community needs, the master plan proposes to build up to 1,400 affordable and market rate units together with a family resource center, eight acres of park space, and the Plaza.

CSCDC partnered with JPMorgan Chase to provide \$15,000,000 in NMTC funding to finance the Plaza. Other financing sources included: \$15,000,000 in NMTC financing from Genesis LA; \$10,000,000 in NMTC financing from the Los Angeles Development Fund; and an additional \$1,500,000 in NMTC financing from JPMorgan Chase. The new 114,000 square foot neighborhood shopping center will encompass 9.6 acres and will include a full-service 30,000 square foot grocery store along with other service, food and beverage, and retail shops. Primestor conducted community outreach by meeting with neighbors, the neighborhood council, community leaders, and local organizations in order to help guide the tenant selection for the Plaza and build support and enthusiasm in the neighborhood.

The Plaza will provide critically needed commercial goods and services to the community through multiple retail tenants, benefiting approximately 11,000 households (or 51,000 people), of which about 70 percent have an annual household income of less than \$50,000. The Plaza is expected to result over 100 construction jobs, 13 new permanent full-time employment jobs related to management of the site

and 230 new permanent full-time employment retail jobs as Plaza tenants.

Background

CSCDC was created as an affiliate community development entity by CSCDA to facilitate investment in low income communities through the use of New Markets Tax Credits. The NMTC program, passed by Congress in 2000, encourages investments in low-income communities by providing a tax incentive for community development lenders and the capital markets to invest in communities that historically have had poor access to capital.

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Take Action on Bills that Would Limit Local Voices in Land Use and Housing Decisions

June 22, 2018

The 2018 legislative session has been another extremely active year for housing and land use legislation with over 100 bills introduced.

What really sets this year apart from prior years is the fact that bills affect nearly every major area of housing and land use law. Although cities have been effective in stopping or helping to get bills amended to address their concerns, a number of priority bills remain that cities should take action before the Legislature adjourns for its summer recess on July 6.

The following bills will be heard in committee the week of June 25. For details, see [Bills in Committee](#).

Planning and Zoning Bills

- **AB 2923 (Chiu, Grayson, Mullin) BART: TOD:** This measure gives Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) land use authority over their property. AB 2923 would require BART to establish Transit Oriented Development (TOD) zoning standards; prohibit a local jurisdiction from imposing parking requirements, maximum building heights, and density limits. This measure would apply to 250 acres at 27 current and planned BART stations. *League Position: Oppose. Location: Senate Transportation and Housing Committee.*
- **SB 765 (Wiener) Planning and Zoning: Streamlined Approval Process:** This measure makes a number of changes to the streamlining approval process as mandated by SB 35 (Wiener), Chapter 366, Statutes of 2017. Most notably, SB 765 expands the by-right approval process to include housing projects that contain 50 percent or more units affordable to households making below 120 percent of area median income. The bill would require the nonresidential portion of a mixed-use project to be subject to the streamlined and ministerial approval process. *League Position: Oppose. Location: Assembly Housing and Community Development Committee.*

Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA)

- **SB 828 (Wiener) Land Use: RHNA:** This measure would require a local jurisdiction to plan and accommodate 125 percent of the RHNA. Local jurisdictions would have to identify 25 percent more sites suitable for housing development in their Housing Element. The bill would also add additional criteria to the methodology for the comprehensive assessment for unmet housing need. *League Position: Oppose Unless Amended. Location: Assembly Local Government Committee.*

Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)

- **SB 831 (Wieckowski) Accessory Dwelling Units:** This measure would require ministerial approval of ADUs on any lot that allows for the construction of a home. The Local agency would have to act within 60 days of submitted application or application is deemed approved. SB 831 would prohibit minimum lot size requirements unless specific findings are made that identify adverse public safety impacts and would exempt ADUs from locally adopted impacts fees. *League Position: Oppose.*
Location: Assembly Local Government Committee.

Next Steps

Cities should take action on each of these bills. While they will all be heard in committee the week of June 25 prior to the recess, negotiations on these bills will continue through the end of session. It will be critical that cities are engaged on these measures now as well as during the final four weeks of the session, Aug. 6–31.

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Help Stop the Attack on Bridge and Road Safety

Prepare Your City to Oppose Repeal of Transportation Funding

June 25, 2018

Cities have a great deal at stake this fall since an initiative to eliminate more than \$5 billion annually in existing transportation funding is expected to officially qualify for the November ballot by the end of today.

The League is part of the Coalition to Protect Transportation Improvements, a group representing firefighters, paramedics, cities, counties, local transportation agencies, the California Chamber of Commerce, environmental groups, business and labor organizations that has formed to fight the attack on bridge and road safety.

Every city in California should oppose the elimination of funding for more than 5,000 state and local road and bridge safety and transportation improvement projects throughout the state. The loss of these projects will jeopardize public safety, lead to further deterioration of the roads and result in worse congestion.

“Cities have thousands of local transportation projects already in the pipeline that will make our roads safer and our commutes better. We have an obligation to every citizen and California driver to defeat this initiative,” said Carolyn Coleman, executive director, League of California Cities.

According to the national *2017 ASCE Infrastructure Report Card*, 50 percent of California’s roads are in poor condition and nearly 1,400 bridges and overpasses are structurally deficient.”

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that there were more than 3,600 fatalities on California roads in 2016.

U.S. Supreme Court Holds Agency Shop Fees Unconstitutional

June 27, 2018

As expected, the U.S. Supreme Court in its highly anticipated decision in *Janus v. AFSCME* struck down a requirement that a represented employee pay an agency shop fee to their designated union violates that employees' First Amendment free speech rights.

Cities and other public agencies now need to move quickly to ensure they are in compliance with the new law. This is particularly critical for those cities that use an automatic payroll deduction for the agency shop fee payment.

In addition, cities need to pay attention to SB 866. This budget trailer bill makes various changes to the law governing the relationship between public employers, their employees, and the unions that represent those employees. This trailer bill was drafted in anticipation that the U.S. Supreme Court would issue the ruling it did. SB 866 is currently on the desk of Gov. Jerry Brown awaiting signature.

Cities should consult with their legal counsel to fully understand the implications of the *Janus* decision and the new requirements that would be imposed if the Governor signs SB 866.
